



1 Main Entry Gate - Designed by Kodo Matsubara, the main entrance features a flower theme exemplified by the embedded flower in the walkway. The large metal grape leaf at the center of the Mon gate represents the agriculture roots of the Central Valley and the sign above the gate roughly translates to *good will garden*, in other words, *friendship garden*.

3 Founders and Donor Board - Designed in the Japanese torii-style by Fresno architect, Art Dyson and built by Sid Mukai.

4 Spring Garden Granite Marker - Each granite marker identifies a seasonal area of the Garden.

5 Ume Grove - The Ume (Japanese apricot tree) produces a canopy of pink and white blooms in January or early February. Enjoy a moment in the Tembo Dai, or waiting shelter overlooking the lily pond – you might even notice a koi fish or two.

6 Camellia Grove & Lake Loop

7 Tea Garden & Tea House - An authentic Japanese Ceremonial Tea House that was originally constructed in Japan, it was then shipped and reassembled inside the garden in 1989.

8 Summer Garden Granite Marker - Wander the path through Ronquillo Meditation Point and view the aesthetically pruned Japanese black pines overlooking the lake.

9 Double Moon Bridge - The Double Moon Bridge, a symbol of good luck, offers an expansive view of the koi pond, Angels Island and Woodward Lake. Many Japanese Gardens feature moon bridges and crossing over the bridge represents the possibility of rebirth.

10 1939 Lantern - This large and historic lantern was originally placed in Roeding Park as a gift and gesture of friendship from the Fresno County Japanese Young Men's Association to the City of Fresno. In 2001, the 11-foot, 3-ton cultural treasure was restored and placed in its new home here at Shinzen Garden.

11 Autumn Garden Granite Marker - Inside the Autumn garden, Chinese pistache, Japanese maples, ginkgo and nandina trees will turn to brilliant reds, oranges and golds in Autumn.

12 Dry Creek - A Japanese symbol of a stream using rocks to impart the image of water (life).

13 Autumn Tembo Dai - A waiting shelter is the perfect place for rest and reflection.

14 Clark Bonsai Collection - Discover a living art display with over 100 bonsai rotating seasonally.

15 Sago Palm Grove

16 Water Fall - The power and sound of the water falling into a creek and merging into the lake is a metaphor of life's journey.

17 Winter Garden Granite Marker - Featuring coastal redwoods, sago palms and juniper trees.

18 Winter Tembo Dai - This is the highest point inside the Garden and provides a breathtaking view across the koi pond and double moon bridge. Here, you can observe the borrowed view design element of a Japanese Garden where you visually borrow the surrounding spaces in order to expand the size of the Garden.

19 Azumaya - Enjoy the panoramic view from the grand tembo dai.

20 Koi Pond - The pond symbolizes the head of a turtle, considered in Japanese legend to represent good fortune. The Double Moon Bridge symbolizes the turtles collar and Woodward Lake is the turtle's body.
